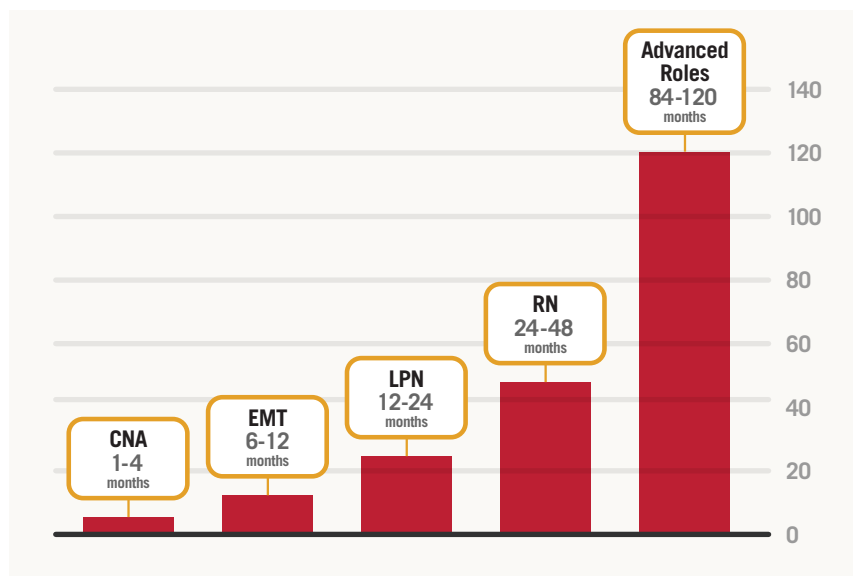

How Long Does It Take to Become a Nurse?

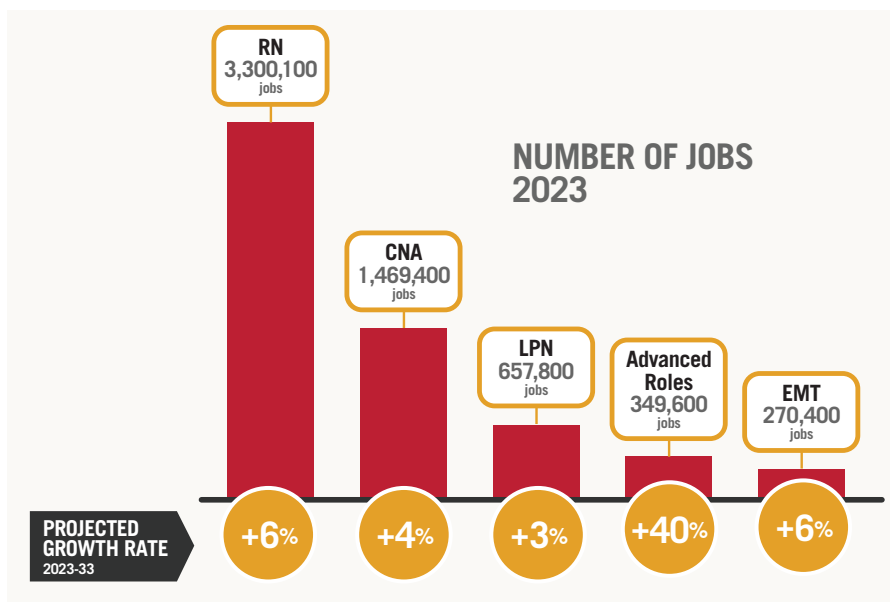

- Tuition reimbursement

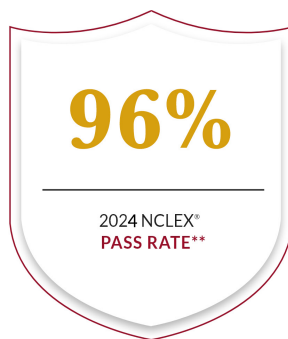
In fact, according to a report in NurseJournal.org, RNs rank 1st in the country for access to childcare, paid family leave, and other wellness benefits.
